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

Jim Strachan Encourages "Mentorship for All"

At our annual Associate Teacher Appreciation Event on April 3, 2018, Jim Strachan was our exceptional keynote speaker, sharing with educators the Ontario Ministry of Education's vision for professionals at all levels of the education system to work together, sharing knowledge and experience in the interest of improving student achievement and well-being.

One aspect of this vision is mentorship, and Jim highlighted the importance of developing mentorship programs that attend to both structure and relationships. "Inside all of our students who come to school each day are their hearts," Jim stated, "and inside every heart of every student are their hopes, dreams, and wishes for their lives and learning. We know creating a safe place for the hearts of our students, is a critical precondition for learning but in order to do this I think it is essential that the hearts of the educators supporting our students are also safe, and secure, and supported. I see this as a reciprocal process. In other words, our students can become part of our mentoring web and we can become part of theirs."
