JOB POSTING – POSTDOCTORAL FELLOW

Areas of Research: Psychology and Education

Description of duties: The successful applicant will be involved in assisting with the coordination of a large-scale research project funded by the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR). This project focuses on the associations among emotions, cognitions, and nonsuicidal self-injurious behaviors among post-secondary students. As part of this work, the successful applicant will be involved in conducting literature reviews, analyzing existing daily diary and ecological momentary assessment data, carrying out follow-up participant interviews and transcribing in Nvivo, and supporting knowledge translation and dissemination (e.g., writing up study findings for peer-reviewed publications, and presenting findings at conferences). The successful applicant also will be involved in co-supervising graduate students and volunteers in the CARE lab (<https://thecarelab.ca/>), and supporting grant applications for additional projects.

Salary: \$45,000 CAD

Required qualifications: Applicants must have a Ph.D. in psychology or a closely related discipline by the time of the start date of the position and be recognized for research excellence. The successful applicant should have a strong record of publishing research in high quality journals, and show a strong potential for excellence in research supervision of undergraduate and/or graduate students. Expertise in the areas of human development, student mental health, and nonsuicidal self-injurious behaviors is also beneficial. Experience analyzing daily diary and ecological momentary assessment data is strongly preferred.
